## Showcase, Alexander show that less can offer more

es, it's possible for a grand opening and quickly return to a semblance of normalcy. The reborn Jazz Showcase proved it late Thurstone the second week in its new quarters in the South Loop.

Most of the technical glitches that surfaced last week, when the Showcase reopened after a year-and-a-half's hiatus, were van-quished. The air-conditioning pumped cold air with a vengeance. Liquor flowed from the bar. The bathroom worked like a charm (well, we can report that at least the men's room did).

Better still, the room sounded superior to a week ago, though this had more to do with the players onstage than anything else. Because the new space is so reverberant, a large group—such as the Junior Mance band that played last week—can produce too much

sound for the setting (this issue might be resolved once the club installs drapes, which could absorb some echo).

But when a trio takes the stage, the acoustics seem practically ideal, a fact that the Monty Alexander Trio took full advantage of. Huddled close to one another, junist Alexander, drummer George Fludas and bassist Lorin Cohen produced a big, bold ensemble sound that filled every crevice of the prom.

As for the Showcase, it's now back to operating seven nights a week, with Chicago artists playing Mondays through Wednesdays, visitors headlining Thursdays through Sundays.
